Dear Parents and Carers,

We are all really enjoying our new computer, not only using it for learning games, but also for star of the day. If you upload video to tapestry, please ensure it is in landscape format to enable us to show it on the new computer screen. Photo's can be in portrait but are also better in landscape.

This week at nursery we will be practising our fine motor skills and how we can 'write' numerals. We will also be creating with tap-a-shape, car-washing and continuing to learn our Chicken Licken songs. We might even get to practice for our sports days.

We have thought long and hard about our end of term events. Initial government announcements make it difficult to run these as anticipated. Whilst there have been some relaxations specifically for education, we are very aware that the rates of the Delta variant in Mole Valley appears to be increasing. Thus we must be cautious. Whilst the nursery is effectively one bubble, with a whole bubble gathering, it will be difficult to maintain any form of social distancing. We have therefore decided to make some sensible adjustments.

Our end of term play will be on Thursday 8th July and will start at about 11.30. Older children (those who are leaving to start school this September) who do not normally attend nursery on a Thursday will still be invited to attend and should arrive at 11.20a.m. I'm afraid we cannot accommodate additional younger children on this occasion. Parents of older children ONLY will form the audience. We are hoping the performance will be outside, so please dress accordingly. Outside gatherings have a 30 number limit which means one parent per child will be allowed to attend. Committee volunteers and staff are not counted within the 30 number limit. No lunch club or afternoon session on Thursday 8th.

We will now have two sports days. Older children will have sports day on Monday 12th July at 2.15p.m. Older children who do not normally attend Forest School afternoon are invited to join us at 2p.m. Again, the attending audience limit is 30, so again, one parent per child please.

Younger children will have sports day on Tuesday 13th July at 11.45. Younger children who do not normally attend on a Tuesday will be invited to attend and should arrive no later than 11.35. Parents of younger children will form the audience for this second sports day event. 30 limit as before. Lunch club will now continue on this day.

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For both sports day events, we will allocate team colours once we have an idea of the numbers of children attending. Wednesday 14th July is a party day for the older children only. Children should arrive at the slightly later time of 9.30, in fancy dress if they wish! We will provide a lunch for the children using our nursery grown potatoes, sausages and peas. Please collect children at 12.30.

We do understand that some children and parents will be disappointed to not be able to participate in all events, but hope that you understand why we are restricting numbers at this time.

We will obviously update you should the situation change.

Communication, Language and Literacy:

Mark making outside can offer children a fresh and exciting opportunity, and may encourage a reluctant mark maker to have a go. Paintbrushes in water or chunky chalks can be used on different surfaces such as walls, fences or patios to create large art work and make marks. These can be easily washed away once finished - and can be part of the fun. Children can extend their language skills by talking about what they are drawing, discuss sound, texture, colour, size (and more!) and how different surfaces affect the marks they make.

Woodland Wonder

Make a frame using similar sized sticks. Then lace some string or wool around them, to create a weaving frame.

Collect natural items like fallen leaves, twigs, feathers, long grasses, daisies, etc and weave these into the frame.


Display it and add to it everytime you collect more woodland treasures.

H is for 'How many...?':

Encourage and support your child's counting, estimating and comparing skills by playing a simple game.

Put a small number of items (all of the same type such as marbles, pine cones, coins etc) in a clear jar or container and encourage your child to guess 'how many...in the jar? Let them guess, then count the items. Change the items, the number of items, use language such as more or less or get them to record their results to extend this simple activity.
